Poynor's chairs are held in the collections of several museums including Yale University, The Museum of early Southern Decorative Arts, and the Tennessee State Museum.

The Brentwood Room also houses photographs and information on many historic landmarks and the earliest Brentwood families. The genealogical data from the early settlers includes photographs, military records and manuscripts.

Government documents, including city budgets, archeological studies and official reports are available for viewing. A section of the room holds scrapbooks and materials of notable Brentwood organizations including the Brentwood Garden Club, The Brentwood Woman's Club, and the Friends of the Brentwood Library. These groups assembled photo albums documenting their events and activities over the years, some going back to the early 1950's.

Interviews and DVD's entitled, "Conversations from Concord House," is a series of historical interviews on Brentwood topics. Audio interviews with dozens of residents are also available. Published records of Williamson County including cemetery inscriptions, marriage records, land and court records are also

housed in the Brentwood Room.

Many writers in the area have generously donated copies of their works to the library. The room houses a collection of local authors and their books. These books cover a wide variety of topics. The Library website has a page for local history and features digital collections of historical photos depicting Brentwood from the late 1800's through the 1970's. Housed on the library's public computers is information from Ancestory.com. The most useful records include the census records for the entire U.S. from 1790 through 1930.

Please visit the Brentwood Room, librarians are more than happy to assist you if you are searching for a specific topic. The community is blessed to have a resource like the Brentwood Room and the goal is for more people to begin utilizing the room.



COMING SOON! Cache in on Brentwood History A Treasure Hunt For all Ages



The Brentwood Historic Commission invites you to join in the fun for a high tech treasure hunt. "Cache in on Brentwood History" is a free, self-guided series of treasure hunts scattered about Brentwood based on geocaching. If you enjoy the outdoors and adventure, then geocaching is for you!

Geocaching began in 2000 and is a real world, outdoor treasure hunting game. It combines technology with outdoor adventure. Players try to locate hidden containers called geo-caches using a handheld GPS or GPS-enabled smartphone and clues. Participants follow the set of GPS coordinates and clues to attempt to find the treasure.

Through "Cache in on Brentwood History" you will discover some of the fascinating history of Brentwood and visit some of our historic gems. You can do them all at once or over a period of time. Keep your eyes peeled for the early fall release date of cache descriptions and be ready to hit the trail!
