## **Community Risk Reduction**





The Brentwood Fire & Rescue Department offers diverse public education programs targeted at specific risks, behaviors, and community audiences. The programs

are developed to educate citizens in fire safety, home safety, CPR, and general fire department education. All Brentwood Fire & Rescue members are required to be active participants in public education efforts. However, we also have a small group of instructors dedicated to educating kindergarten and first-grade children in fire safety utilizing the mobile Fire Safety House. Public education is a daily operation within the department, with special programs and events occurring at specific times each year.

## **EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE**

The Brentwood Fire and Rescue Department is responsible for providing emergency medical response for the citizens and visitors of Brentwood. Through an Advanced Responder Agreement with Williamson Medical Center EMS (WEMS), Brentwood Fire and Rescue provides the initial response, care, and treatment for medical emergencies. The department delivers advanced life support (ALS) care through the response of engine companies located at each of the department's four fire stations. The department employs emergency medical responders (EMRs), basic and advanced emergency medical technicians (EMTs), and paramedics to staff engine companies, a rescue company, a ladder company, and a command vehicle.

## **UAS OPERATIONS**

The purpose of the UAS (Unmanned Aerial System) Team at Brentwood Fire and Rescue is to provide immediate UAS support at any time to assist in making operational decisions and completing incident objectives. The UAS team consists of 8 pilots who are licensed under the FAA Part 107 that operate 3 DJI Mavic Pro UAS. Since its inception UAS Team members have provided support on several incidents inside and outside the city Including

hazardous materials incidents, structure fires, lost persons and law enforcement search support. The UAS Team is also used by the Community Relations and GIS departments to capture media for use on city projects and events.





## **PEER SUPPORT**

Behavioral and mental wellness are a vital part of our overall health. We recognize that this is a significant challenge to anyone, especially in the first responder community. We are proud to have launched a program that utilizes our own firefighters to support the mental health needs of the department. As a group of non-clinical assistance, our Peer Support Team can help others in a variety of situations, and it comes from someone that knows the specific challenges of being a first responder. These situations not only include traumatic events that occur on the job, but also provides support and resources for matters that pertain to an individual's personal life.



The Peer Support Team is able to provide assistance to the department by offering education, response to traumatic events, and resources provided to members. The most important of these priorities is the education aspect. It is nearly guaranteed that every firefighter will experience some sort of trauma throughout their career, which can impact their personal and professional lives. Education is meant to provide members with the tools to prevent, recognize, and overcome these obstacles. With the proper education and resources, we believe that every firefighter can have a long, healthy career.



### **AWARDS**



John LoPiccolo Lieutenant Lt. John "Pic" LoPiccolo has been awarded the 2022 Civic Award by the Brentwood Fire & Rescue Department. In January of this year, Lt. LoPiccolo organized and executed Brentwood's first smoke alarm campaign targeting multi-occupancy households in his first-due district. After installing more than 40 smoke alarms on a single morning, Pic then organized two more similar events resulting in the installation of over 100 smoke alarms. In addition to his dedication to protecting our residents, Lt. LoPiccolo also partnered with local churches and non-profits to collect personal items and medical supplies to be sent to the Ukraine. His efforts resulted in several pallets of items being shipped to areas in need in cooperation with Mission to Ukraine<sup>®</sup>. These endeavors are typical of Lt. LoPiccolo who is always in search of opportunities to serve those less fortunate. For his efforts in these areas and so much more, Lt. John LoPiccolo has been awarded the 2022 Brentwood Fire & Rescue Civic Award.
